


Things to remember...

LOCATION

Peace Arch International Parks are located 21 miles north of Bellingham, Washington, and 30 miles south of Vancouver, BC, on the USA Canada border between Douglas, BC, and Blaine, WA. The parks are managed and maintained by Washington State Parks and British Columbia Parks.



Washington State Parks requires state residents and visitors to purchase a Discover Pass (vehicle pass) to visit Peace Arch State Park. The Discover Pass fee is \$10.00 (single day use) or \$30 for an annual pass good at all Washington State Parks. Complete Discover Pass information and a parking payment station is posted at the main park kiosk.

COVID-19 ALERT: As you visit the state park and the exhibit, keep in mind 6 feet social distancing measures set by Washington State Department of Health.
